- Ensuring connectivity between service organizations, educators, business, and industry






# What is the goal of YOUTH PATHWAYS?



- Documenting specialty workshops and classes for children and teachers
- Supporting K- 20 classes w/ riparian field trips and lesson plans
- Developing a framework for collaboration & shared resources
- Leveraging shared resources in riparian habitat restoration, including internship & early entry
- Demonstrating career opportunities in Natural Resource management
- Working with local high schools students in a monitoring effort


# What's next and how to get involved or stay engaged?

- United effort for volunteer events throughout the Verde Valley





- Don't overthink the process. Keep people safe, engaged and provide meaningful experiences. Give purpose!






