BIRD SKETCHING & JOURNALING

With LINDA FELTNER

This weekend provides a unique opportunity for participants to work with Linda Feltner, focusing on sketching birds and journaling. The outdoor session will visit local birdfeeders to take the opportunity to "put observations on paper." Close observation and curiosity are key to science and sketching, and it has been said that one doesn't really know something until one has tried to draw it. Field sketching is more than making art; it is another way to collect information. During this field trip, you will be drawing to learn as well as learning to draw.



During the practice sessions, Linda will point out the differences between the bird illustrations in field guides and field sketching the postures, behaviors, and different angles observed in real life. She will talk about the importance of practice and strengthening visual memory, making comparisons between individuals and between species, and how to suggest movement and aliveness in your sketches. You will learn about the challenges of sketching moving subjects,



and some helpful shorthand sketching techniques. You will practice: looking for basic shapes, doing gesture sketches that can tell what a bird is doing and not so much what it looks like, using light and dark lines, keeping it simple, and leaving some drawings unfinished. You will learn how to add shading and texture when time permits. You will also learn the value in making written notes about bird details that can't be drawn and about the details in the environment. Linda will also give a demonstration on how color notes can be added to sketches with simple watercolor supplies.

The outdoor session will be about sketching birds and journaling, but

more importantly, it is about sketching birds and journaling for your own personal use and enjoyment. Sketches help one to remember individual details; just the act of making a sketch forces one to examine each and every part of your subject. Learning to see and learning to draw go hand in hand!

BIOGRAPHY: Linda M. Feltner is an award-winning nature artist and educator. She combines the creativity of artistic design with strict standards of scientific accuracy into what has become her trademark. Her areas of expertise include painting and drawing, teaching, guiding birding tours, and maintaining her flourishing freelance business in fine art and interpretive illustration. Linda has served as President of the Guild of Natural Science Illustrators from 2016 through 2018 and is a Signature Member of the Society of Animal Artists and



Artists for Conservation. Linda aims to provide a spark – to awaken curiosity and invite questions, promote an appreciation for the complexity of nature, and foster a desire to protect it.



As an interpretive specialist, Linda's multi-disciplinary career includes scientific illustration and interpretive media design of educational graphics for the public through indoor and outdoor exhibits, murals, and interactive graphics. Her combined experience provided artwork for over 120 projects for the National Park Service, Bureau of Land Management, US Forest Service, and Mount St. Helens National Volcanic Monument. She brings extensive, first-hand knowledge and enthusiasm for the natural and cultural history subjects.

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DESCRIPTION:

The Arizona Young Birders Camp is an annual event designed to draw together young birders from around the state of Arizona and to provide them with the opportunity to learn about birds, ecology, and conservation in the company of their peers. The camp provides educational opportunities through field trips observing birds and other facets of our natural world, and through presentations given by regional birding experts and by youths attending the camp. The following information is provided to prepare young birders and their parents for what to expect during the camp. This document also has forms that must be completed and signed in order to participate in the Arizona Young Birders Camp. Please read through this document thoroughly and carefully.

LOCATION, HABITAT & BIRDS:

The camp takes place in Cave Creek Canyon of the Chiricahua Mountains, one of the most renowned places in North America to go birding. The open country below the canyon is host to birds found in the desert and grassland habitat, including: Scaled and Gambel's Quail, Ladder- backed Woodpecker, Chihuahuan Raven, Curvebilled Thrasher, Loggerhead Shrike, Black-throated Sparrow, Scott's Oriole, and Eastern Meadowlark. Up in the canyon, the South Fork of Cave Creek is a beautiful riparian corridor that drains the canyon. Lush riparian vegetation, including sycamore, oak, pines, and cypress provide excellent habitat for many species of birds, including: Elegant Trogon, Arizona Woodpecker, Sulphur-bellied and Dusky-capped flycatchers, Hutton's and Plumbeous Vireos, Grace's Warbler, Painted Redstart, and Hepatic Tanager. The Southwestern Research Station itself will also afford excellent birding, and the hummingbird feeders alone will offer wonderful views of dozens of hummingbirds, including: Blue-throated, Magnificent, Broad-tailed, Black-chinned, and Anna's Hummingbirds.

PARTICIPATION:

The camp is open to youths between the ages of 8 and 18 years of age and welcomes birders of all skill levels, including novices. Parents of youths age 10 and under are also encouraged to attend with their children. The camp is limited to 25 participants, including any parents that may accompany their children. Parents are allowed to participate during the daily presentations and the Sunday field trip, but principally as passive observers and chaperones, and are requested to "stand back" and let the youths direct how the weekend proceeds (i.e. with asking questions, use of spotting scopes, etc.).

WHAT TO BRING:

Because the field trips may cover a variety of elevations, it is important to be prepared for a variety of conditions. The desert and grasslands may reach up to 90° and the evenings in the canyon may fall into the mid 40°'s. Although this camp will be held earlier than the typical monsoon season, it is advisable to check the weather conditions beforehand and pack clothing for rain or humidity. Most clothing should be associated with warm weather, but layers are advisable. Pants, a long-sleeved shirt, and a light jacket may be handy for the early morning or late evening optional field trips. Quick-drying clothing is always recommended. A hat is essential, as well as sun protection and a container for water. Good fitting footwear is also mandatory as some hiking on trails will take place during field trips. A belt pack or day pack is recommended for carrying books, journal/note pad, sunscreen, a one-quart water bottle, cameras, etc. *Other recommended items include a camera, insect repellent, flashlight and/or headlamp, journal/note pad, and sketching pens and pencils*. A pair of binoculars that are in good repair are recommended (loaners will be available as well). The field trip leaders will have spotting scopes, but if you have one and wish to bring it, feel free to do so.

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ACCOMODATIONS:

All accommodations will be provided by the Southwestern Research Station (SWRS). The SWRS is a year round field station under the direction of the Science Department at the American Museum of Natural History in New York. Since 1955, it has served biologists, geologists, and anthropologists interested in studying the diverse environments and biotas of the Chiricahua Mountains in southeastern Arizona. More information about the SWRS is available at http://research.amnh.org/swrs. The following information is provided on behalf of the research station:

- All meals are served promptly at 7:30 am, 12:00 noon, and 6:00 pm. Guests eat family style in the dining room or at outside picnic tables.
- Wireless is available in most outdoor research station locations. Internet at the station is free.
- The research station has NO cell phone service. A phone is located in the computer room and you may purchase a calling card in the Main Office or Gift Shop. Guests CANNOT be reached through the main research station number, 520-558-2396, except in real emergencies. Email is the best form of communication at the SWRS.
- All lodging is in dorms. The dorm accommodations are rooms with 2 or 3 single beds. The dorm rooms do NOT have bathrooms or showers a common use bathroom with shower is provided.
- All linens are supplied. Dorm rooms do not have televisions or telephones. A common-use refrigerator is available.
- During breaks, participants will be free to relax, play games, catch up on notes and lists, or explore the immediate area in small groups.

FEE, PAYMENT & CANCELLATIONS:

The fee for the camp is \$325 per child and \$350 per adult and is *due no later than April 30th*. This includes all meals from dinner on Thursday through lunch on Sunday, all accommodations as detailed in this document, and leadership services provided by the volunteers. The fee does not include any transportation expenses (i.e. gas, use of vehicle, etc.) and carpooling is strongly encouraged.

To register for the camp, please contact an SSVYBC administrator. Payment in full may be provided in the form of a check or money order. The included registration forms MUST be completed, signed, and provided along with payment. The registration deadline for the camp is April 30th. Registrations are on a first come, first served basis. If registration is full you will be notified by email and offered the option to be put on a waiting list.

A full refund will be provided if cancellation is given in writing to an SSVYBC administrator 45 days or more before the first day of camp. If cancellation is given in writing fewer than 45 days before the first day of camp, a refund shall be provided ONLY if another participant registers to fill the vacancy, otherwise, no refund shall be provided.

A limited number of scholarships are available through the Sulphur Springs Valley Young Birders Club (SSVYBC) and awarded to participants who otherwise could not attend. All scholarship recipients are expected to give a presentation or similar on Saturday evening. Please contact an SSVYBC administrator for further information (admin@the-cranes.org).
