## Welcome to Vermilion Central!

During this year's Verde Valley Birding and Nature Festival, Mike and I, along with our son Eamonn and his spouse Dennis, hosted birders for the Birding and Beef field trip. Birders traveled down our ranch road, spotting grassland birds on the way, before arriving at our compound, Rancho Tres Brisas. This year it was Vermilion Central. We had more vermilion flycatchers (VFC for short) than any other year since I've lived here. There were four nesting pairs in the compound area alone. The birding group reported seeing at least ten more pairs of VFC as they explored the Tres Brisas property, which includes about ¼ mile of Verde River frontage.

Vermilion flycatcher males are small brightly colored vermilion and black birds that sit prominently on a branch looking for flies. The female is gray black with some pink on her underside. In Oaxacan lore they are called the buen viaje bird. Literally the "good travel bird." They live from the USA's southwest deserts

down to central Argentina. Their Latin name means "firehead."

The Verde is a ribbon of green in Central Arizona, providing habitat for VFCs and other creatures that depend on flowing water. The birders for the VVBNF saw over 50 species of birds at our property. From a majestic redtail hawk, to an osprey, countless yellow warblers, and more, it was a great day for birds at Tres Brisas.

VCFs and other river denizens will only live if our Verde River is healthy and flowing. Your generous gift to Friends of the Verde River will ensure our river continues to be healthy and flowing.

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# **River Otter Spotters**

We've enjoyed seeing river otters many times while out hiking by the Verde or one of its tributaries. It's always a delight! Jon Fuller, in his book Verde River Elegy, said it was a rare day that he didn't see otters while he was boating on his journey from the Verde's headwaters in Chino Valley to Horseshoe Reservoir.

But we don't know a whole lot about the river otters that live here. To learn more, we are teaming up with The River Otter Ecology Project in northern California to start a new community science project. It is called Otter Spotter and will help us to learn more about river otters in Arizona.

#### WHAT IS OTTER SPOTTER?

When you see river otters, snap a photo, if you can, and record as much information as you know – the time and date, location, any behaviors you see, and so on. Otter Spotter uses a website called FieldScope so



that the data can be available for scientists to use in understanding river otter ecology. By recording your sightings of otters in Otter Spotter, we'll expand our knowledge of river otters – where they are, if their population is growing or declining, and common behaviors.

With your help we can ensure that otters will continue to grace the banks and waterways of the Verde River for future generations to enjoy.












This spring, Friends of the Verde River partnered with Mingus Union High School to solve some problems with flooding and erosion at the corner of Camino Real and Fir St in Cottonwood. While we control the flooding problem, we can also put some water back into the ground. Rain runoff from the Mingus Union parking lot regularly flooded the road, carrying sediment and pollution into the river. The erosion and flooding at this intersection was listed as the #5 priority on the City of Cottonwood's Drainage Master Plan.

Now you see a decorative gabion wall and a series of infiltration trenches. They will slow down the water and allow it to sink into the ground. The system has already been tested and passed during an early May storm! The changes reduce erosion, keep sediment and pollution out of the river, and increase groundwater recharge.

The project is designed to infiltrate about 2 million gallons of water per year, on average. This is the equivalent of the water use of as many as 25 homes in the Verde Valley! We are grateful to all our partners: The Nature Conservancy, City of Cottonwood, Yavapai County Flood Control District, Nina Mason Pulliam Charitable Trust, and Mingus Union High School. The project was designed by Shephard & Wesnitzer, Inc, (SWI Engineering) and constructed by Longfellow Excavation, LLC.
